



2013 Vote Record

Each year Washington Farm Bureau provides our members with an indication of how legislators voted on issues of interest to agriculture.

From the beginning of the 2013 regular legislative session, legislators and observers alike realized that vast philosophical differences separated the House and Senate. The House, controlled by Democrats, consistently took the position that tax increases would be needed to fully fund additional spending on basic education, as required by last year's state Supreme Court ruling in the *McCleary* case.

Our primary goal during the 2013 legislative sessions was to prevent the passage of bills that would have increased the tax and/or regulatory burden on the agricultural industry.

That goal was helped when 23 Republicans and two Democrats in the Senate formed the Majority Caucus Coalition. With its one-vote majority, the coalition provided – for the first time in many years – a counterbalance to the House majority party's emphasis on raising taxes.

Balancing the state budget was once again the greatest challenge of the session. The Senate drafted a balanced budget that did not rely on tax increases, while the House budget relied on nearly \$1 billion in new taxes – not spending reductions and government reforms – to balance the budget.

In the end, an increase in the state's revenue forecast of approximately \$300 million helped the two chambers reach a final agreement that did not rely on new taxes. Legislators overwhelmingly passed a \$33.6 billion two-year state operating budget that provides more than \$1 billion dollars in new funding for K-12 education and prevents higher education tuition increases for the first time in 27 years – all without increasing the general tax burden on either individuals or businesses.

Still, there were broad policy disagreements between the two chambers on issues such as health care and labor. This vote record explores those differences, attempts to measure the success made in each of those areas and informs our members of how their legislators voted on the issues most important to our state's farm and ranch families.

It must be noted that many bills of importance to Washington agriculture never made it to the floor of the House or Senate for a vote. In some cases, the Legislature avoided controversial issues. In other cases, your Farm Bureau lobby team was successful in defeating harmful legislation at the committee level. And, in some instances, legislation Farm Bureau supported did not advance from committee.

Legislators received credit for each correct vote cast. Unless otherwise noted, the vote listed for each bill is the one cast for the final version of the bill. Also, as we have done in years past, we have deducted one percentage point from the score for each missed vote. We understand that legislators sometimes miss votes because they are in negotiations on other bills. However, the fact remains that the legislator did not participate in a vote on a bill of importance to agriculture.

We hope this vote record will assist our members in opening a dialogue with elected officials and in fostering a working relationship with them.

Here is a summary of the bills used in this year's vote record:

EHB 1044 – Mandated Health Care Coverage for Abortion: This bill would have required health care providers to offer abortion coverage that was substantially equivalent to their maternity coverage. The bill passed the House 53-43-0-2 (Yeas-Nays-Absent-Excused). Farm Bureau opposed this bill.

ESHB 1057 – House Operating Budget: This bill was the first version of the House 2013-15 operating budget. It relied on a \$1 billion tax increase to balance the budget and contained no reforms or substantive spending reductions. It passed the House 53-35-0-9. Farm Bureau opposed this bill.

HB 1113 – Department of Ecology Peer-Reviewed Science: This measure requires the Department of Ecology to identify the peer-reviewed science, scientific literature and other sources of information being relied upon before taking significant agency action in certain programs. The bill passed the House and Senate unanimously. Farm Bureau supported this bill.

EHB 1891 – Increasing WISHA Penalties: This bill would have increased the requirements and penalties on employers under the Washington Industrial Safety and Health Act. It passed the House 65-32-0-1. Farm Bureau opposed the bill.

ESHB 2034 – Eliminating Tax Preferences: Like ESHB 2038, this proposal sought to raise taxes to fund the increased spending in the House's budget proposal. It would have imposed a \$250 million tax on bottled water, the travel industry and the high-tech industry. We successfully lobbied to remove proposed tax increases on services essential to the international trade of agricultural products. Farm Bureau continued to oppose the final version of this bill, which passed the House 52-40-0-5, because it would have unnecessarily raised taxes.

ESHB 2038 – Eliminating Tax Preferences: This measure would have raised \$1 billion in taxes by eliminating a broad range of tax preferences, and it was designed to pay for increased spending in the House budget. Three specific tax preferences included in the bill would have increased the cost of exporting ag products. The House passed the bill 50-47-0-1. Farm Bureau opposed this legislation.

SSB 5034 – Biennial Operating Budget: Several versions of this bill are on the vote record. The first vote, 30-18-0-1 in the Senate, was on the Senate's proposal to balance the budget with reforms, reductions and no tax increases. Farm Bureau supported this approach to budgeting. However, the House responded by amending the bill into a budget that relied on tax increases. Farm Bureau opposed that approach, which passed the House 54-43-0-1. The last vote on this bill was the bipartisan compromise,

which did not rely on general tax increases to fund the biennial budget. The final vote was 44-4-0-1 in the Senate and 81-11-0-5 in the House. Farm Bureau supported this final budget agreement.

SB 5112 – Retro Scheduling Authority: This measure would have allowed retrospective ratings programs to schedule certain independent medical exams and vocational rehabilitation appointments for injured workers. Farm Bureau supported this bill, which passed the Senate 25-24.

ESSB 5127 – Structured Settlement Agreements: This bill would have allowed more workers the option of choosing a structured settlement agreement in exchange for closing their workers' compensation claims. The bill passed the Senate twice, 30-19 during the regular session and 27-18-0-4 during the first special session. Farm Bureau supported this bill.

E2SSB 5193 – Wolf Management: This measure establishes a mechanism for providing compensation for damage to livestock caused by wolves and provides stable funding for the wolf management program through a \$10 increase to the fee for personalized license plates. The first vote in the Senate was 28-21. The amended bill passed the House 96-2 and Senate 43-1-0-5 after the state Fish & Wildlife Commission adopted a rule allowing landowners to use lethal force against wolves that are caught in the act of attacking livestock. Farm Bureau supported 5193, contingent on the adoption of the rule.

SB 5367 – Yakima River Basin Integrated Plan: This bill authorizes Ecology to implement the integrated plan and develop water supply solutions providing concurrent benefits to both in and out-of-stream users. Farm Bureau supported this bill, which passed the Senate 48-0-0-1 and the House 80-2-0-15.

SSB 5605 – Association Health Plans: This proposal would have provided certain protections for association health plans provided through associations or member-governed groups. The bill passed the Senate 38-11. Farm Bureau supported this bill.

ESB 5616 – Farm Vehicles: This bill expands the use of farm vehicles on public roadways from a 15-mile radius to a 25-mile radius. It also requires Q stickers to be visible from the rear of the vehicle. Farm Bureau supported this bill, which passed both chambers unanimously.

SB 5882 – Ag Tax Benefits: This tax measure, supported by Farm Bureau, creates or extends three agricultural tax preferences to help the honey bee industry, mint growers and dairy producers remain competitive. It passed the Senate 43-5-0-1 and the House 66-25-0-6.

ESB 5903 – Paid Family Leave: The bill would have made changes to the state's paid family leave insurance program, up to and including repeal. The bill passed the Senate 27-21-0-1. Farm Bureau supported this bill and supports full repeal of the paid family leave insurance program.
