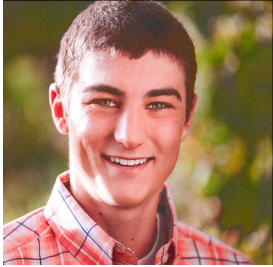


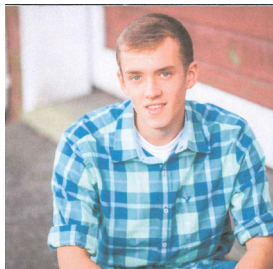
Congratulations to the 2018 Ray DeVries Scholarship Recipients

Each year the Washington Farm Bureau offers up to five (5) \$2,000 scholarships as part of the Ray DeVries Memorial Scholarship program.

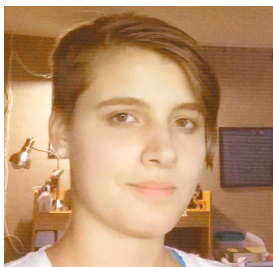
These scholarships are awarded to undergraduate students currently enrolled in agriculture or a related field at an accredited college or university. Applicants must have completed at least one year of secondary education.
